THE DELCO/ CHESCO NURSE HONOR GUARD

HONORING THE SACRIFICES OF LOCAL NURSES

As the world awakens with spring, it is a fitting time to reflect on the legacies that sustain our community. While spring often focuses on the future, the local chapter of the Nurse Honor Guard honors a lifetime of dedication. Through solemn tributes and selfless service, this group ensures that the “healing light” a nurse carries throughout their career is recognized one final time.

The Nurse Honor Guard began in 2003 with the Kansas State Nurses Association. What started as a dedicated group of volunteer nurses paying tribute to their colleagues who have passed away has since expanded to include over 250 groups across the United States. Each group operates independently, which allows for local customs and practices while adhering to the core mission of honoring nurses.

The Delaware/Chester County chapter of the Nurse Honor Guard provides a tribute to any RN or LPN who passed away in the Delaware/Chester County area. Founded in 2024 by Marianne Antes, a hospice nurse from Delaware County, the chapter has 32 members and continues to grow. Marianne said she was inspired to start the local chapter after seeing an online tribute video. “I was so moved by the video,” she recalled. “It reminded me that as nurses, we make many sacrifices, which was especially evident after the COVID pandemic. Nurses definitely deserved to be recognized.”

From frontline nurses to college professors, the local chapter is made up of nurses from all stages of their careers, including working, retired, or semi-retired nurses.

Donna Yarnell, a Broomall resident and member of the Delco/Chesco Nurse Honor Guard, explained that the program partners with

nursing homes, adult living centers, and funeral homes to get the word out about this special ceremony, packed with meaning and reverence for the nurse caregiver’s life.

“From my place beside families in their hardest moments, I’ve seen how a nurse honor guard brings a rare kind of comfort,” said Funeral Director Rob D’Anjolell. “Their presence at a memorial service offers comfort to grieving families, reinforcing the idea that their loved one’s contributions were meaningful and appreciated.”

The Honor Guard tribute lasts approximately five minutes, with each Guard nurse dressed in the traditional white uniform, white cap, blue cape, and white gloves. During the ceremony, volunteers recite the Nightingale Tribute. A white rose is placed on the casket or next to

the urn, symbolizing the nurse’s dedication to the profession. Afterward, the nurse’s name is called three times, followed by the ringing of a triangle. Then the nurse is honorably relieved from nursing duties, and the light from a Nightingale lamp, that had been carried into the ceremony, is extinguished before handing it over to the family.

This initiative draws inspiration from military honor guards, adapting the concept to honor nurses specifically. The primary purpose is to recognize the profound contributions of nurses throughout their careers.

“Nurses are often away from home, taking care of others and their families,” said Donna. “These ceremonies serve to acknowledge their dedication to caring for others, even in the face of personal sacrifice.”

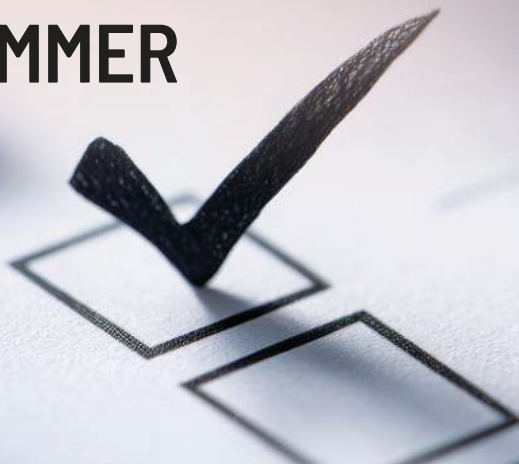

ENSURE PROPER ATTIC VENTILATION

Finally, check that attic vents are clear and working properly. Good ventilation helps regulate temperature and moisture levels, preventing mold, wood rot, and heat damage to shingles. Proper airflow also helps protect your roof and improve overall home comfort.

STANDING TALL: *The Mayo Women*

There is a moment that happens regularly in local grocery stores, coffee shops, and restaurants. A woman with a warm smile walks in, and strangers become not-so-strangers. Current dance students and graduates from decades past light up. They cross the room. They want to introduce themselves to her daughters, share a story about the time Miss Carmela remembered their names years after they stopped taking classes, or simply say thank you.

"Our curly hair is a dead giveaway," laughs Victoria Mayo. "You can't really miss all three of our curls when we're together."

For Carmela Mayo and her daughters, Victoria and Carly, that "Hallmark moment" — as Victoria calls it — happens all the time. And it makes perfect sense. For 40 years, the Mayo family has been woven into the fabric of Springfield in a way that few families are. Carmela built a dance studio here. Her daughters grew up, moved away, and came back to build a fitness business here. And together, the three of them show up — for their students, their clients, their community, and each other — every single day.

It started, as so many Springfield stories do, with a decision to put down roots.



Carmela and her then-husband moved their family from New York City to Springfield 40 years ago, expecting their second child and wanting to be closer to family in Drexel Hill and Springfield. What they found was more than proximity to relatives. They found a village.

"St. Francis of Assisi and our family became the village that was needed to raise my three children," Carmela says. "My children felt safe and cared for in every aspect of their lives. We became rooted here for life."

Her daughter Carly, who spent eight years in New York City pursuing an acting career, always knew she would return. When she met her husband, Andrew, in the city, it was understood early on that Springfield was in the future.

"I had such a great childhood here that it's the only place I wanted to be with my family," Carly says. "We call it the bubble. Springfield is a special place that way."

Victoria echoes the sentiment with the particular clarity of someone who left and came back by choice. "These are streets we learned to ride bikes on, parking lots we learned to drive in, Wawas that know us by name," she says. "Springfield is a place we moved away from in our early 20s to

expand our horizons and the hometown that brought us back to continue to plant roots."

Today, the three women run both Carmela's Dance Studio and CFIT Fitness – seven days a week, together. Their days begin before 5 a.m. with coffee and a flurry of texts about class schedules and business logistics, and rarely wind down before 9:30 at night. Victoria teaches fitness classes and works with personal training clients throughout the day. Carmela, at 72, still carries a full load of dance classes weekly while also handling school pickups for Carly's three children – Melody, 11, Louis, 9, and Dean, 6. Carly moves between both businesses, teaching and managing, with her husband serving as what the family laughingly calls their "unofficial and unpaid CEO."

"In short," Carly says, "it all overlaps."

What doesn't get lost in the overlap is community. One of the family's most beloved traditions is the Springfield St. Patrick's Day Parade – and their most memorable parade moment came not during a grand procession, but a quiet one. During the Covid years, when the parade was canceled two years running, Carmela lobbied the township for a workaround: a small loop around the library and township building so her dance students wouldn't miss another year. They said yes. Carmela strapped on her stilts – she has been stiltwalking for 36 years, once the only female stiltwalker in Philadelphia – and led hundreds of girls around the loop four times.

"For some, it was their first parade," Carly recalls. "Hundreds of people came out to watch, and while it wasn't the massive parade we were used to, it was a glimmer of normalcy in a time that was uncertain for a lot of people."

That instinct – to show up, to find a way, to bring people together – is the throughline of the Mayo family story. Carmela built something from a dream and a community willing to support it. Her daughters watched, learned, and followed.

"She paved the way," Victoria says simply. "She taught us that a smile and lending an ear go a long way in this world."

Springfield, it seems, has been listening all along.

A YEAR IN SPRINGFIELD: AN EXCHANGE STUDENT'S AMERICAN ADVENTURE

When Iker Viscioso arrived in Springfield from his small village outside Madrid last fall, he came with an open mind, a tennis racket, and no idea what a Wawa was. Ten months later, he leaves with new friendships, a spot on the high school tennis team, and a deep appreciation for what he describes as one of America's most underrated institutions.

"People kept talking about it and I didn't understand why a store I'd never heard of was so popular," he laughs. "But after getting there and trying it, it became something essential to my experience – and it's going to be really sad to leave it behind."

Iker is spending his school year with host parents Anthony and Sharon Rubbo and their son Alexander in Springfield, through the organization International Student Exchange (ISE). Sharon had read about the program online and brought the idea to Alexander, then about to start his freshman year. An only child, he was enthusiastic. The match, Sharon says, turned out to be nearly perfect.

"We became a family of four," she says. "The joy of no longer having an only child, and getting to experience what that would be like for each of us – that's what I'll remember most. He fit into our family very well."

For Iker, Springfield felt surprisingly like home from the start. His village outside Madrid is small and walkable, where neighbors know each other and everything is within reach. Springfield, he found, works the same way. "It has really amazing people who helped me with a lot of things and made me feel at home," he says.

The biggest culture shock wasn't social – it was academic, and it ran in an unexpected direction. School in Spain is considerably more rigorous, Iker says. Students carry heavy textbooks rather than Chromebooks, teachers rotate between classrooms instead of students, and exams are essay-based rather than multiple choice. His lowest grade at Springfield High this year has been an 80 – without studying.

On the courts and in the pool, Iker has been all in. A competitive tennis player back home, he earned the number two singles spot on the Springfield High School tennis team. Before tennis season, he chose swimming as his winter sport – a decision that paid off in friendships as much as fitness.



As his year winds down, it's the people he'll miss most. And yes, the Wawa.

Sharon's message to any Springfield family curious about hosting is simple: "Go for it. There are so many lessons you will learn about yourself, others, and your own family. The entire experience has been beneficial in so many ways."
